Teach Your Monster to Read App

Fine motor skills

- To cut along different lines accurately using scissors.
- Playdough modelling.
- To hold a pencil using tripod grip (pinch, pick, flick)
- To write name with correct formation.

Social Skills

- To take turns fairly and share.
- To **use our words** to explain our feelings.
- To keep ourselves and each other safe (i.e., walking feet)
- To look after our classroom and tidy up.

How our learning will link to the wider world

We will be learning about the United Kingdom and the countries within it, as well as the Monarchy.

We will be learning about and celebrating different cultural festivals from around the world, such as Harvest Festival and Sukkot.

Phonics

- To share rhyming books with your child and recognise rhyming words.
- To finish a rhyming string.
- To identify the first sound in words. i.e., c- for cat.
- To use pink sounds book daily to develop recall of the letter sounds and recognition of the letter shapes.

Maths

- To match and sort items into groups; identifying certain criteria when noticing similarities and differences. i.e., things that are round, things that are not.
- To practise counting with 1:1 correspondence when comparing quantities.
- To compare size, mass and capacity.
- To make simple repeating patterns.
